# Show and Tell 09:00











**Jeff Olive**: Showed a Spurtle made from Bocote. he material is so oily that no finish is needed.

**Nathan McCollim:** Showed a pen that used a 3D printed form which was then filled with epoxy prior to turning. He showed a lamp that he made with his inside-out technique.

Mark McClain: Showed a Cherry pan and a Walnut bowl











Al McCoy:

Showed a five-sided form that he made for the Art Show. He then used black iridescent paint.

**Doug Olson:** Showed Hickory hollow forms and a Pecan with a natural edge.

Dale Heuer: Elm bowl that is in progress and asked for feedback on how to stabilize punky wood.

Bruce Pelton: Adaption of a sharpening jig for secondary and tertiary bevels on an Irish Grind.





**Jack Lawrence:** Showed Christmas tree forms made from bat blanks and painted by his grandkids. He had an accidental catch and realized that it made them more interesting. He did the others with more catches. The segmented form was his first try with a glued-up assembly.

# **Demonstration:** Bill Cunningham- Norfolk Island Pine Turning

Bill read an extensive piece on the formation and history of Norfolk Island Pine. It is rare and proper blanks can be very expensive. The radial branches provide interesting markings and the material can be translucent if turned thin enough.

## He showed us several finished project images on his phone



Bill showed a chart depicting the growth of the trees. The branches grow radially and may angle upwards or downwards. The best blanks which can run to hundreds of dollars have the branches closely aligned an equal distance from the edge. He showed how he marked the equatorial line to determine optimal depth of the bowl bottom.





He showed the desired final form with a pedestal and bowl whose bottom showed the radiating forms of the pith of the branches.





He mounted the blank between centers and turned the tenon. While it was between centers he began to form the pedestal. He then chucked the piece and supported it with a live enter as long as possible.





He began to hollow with support and got as deep as possible while supported. He then removed the tail stock and continued hollowing.





He continued to thin the walls and turned down to the branch imprints. It was not possible to reach the pith of all and he had to compromise before going too deep. When the final depth was reached, he sanded the interior and formed the pedestal. He then sanded and finished the entire piece.
